1. Opening Prayer

Nancy Cargioli led the prayer.

3. Welcome, Introductions and Attendance

Gord Gallimore called the meeting to order at 6:40 p.m.

5. Approval of the Minutes – June 19, 2023

6. Welcoming Superintendent Wayne Brunton

Nancy Cargioli advised that Michelle Coutinho, Principal of Equitable and Inclusive Education, retired at the end of September. She was a champion of Equity and will be greatly missed at the Board. Michelle had hoped to say goodbye at the September meeting that was cancelled. Wayne Brunton is now the Superintendent of Equity and Indigenous Education and will continue his role as Co-Chair of BCAC. Nancy also thanked Superintendent Max Vecchiarino who had previously been Co-Chair with Gord Gallimore.

7. Welcoming New BCAC Members and Thank You to Previous BCAC Members

Nancy Cargioli thanked the previous members of the BCAC for the work they had done.

8. Information Items:

a. Review of BCAC Mandate and Council Work

Nancy Cargioli advised that the BCAC mandate is to play an active role in reviewing, advising and making recommendations to the Board of Trustees on strategies to identify and dismantle

anti-Black racism within all educational spaces. The goal of the council is to work towards creating equitable outcomes with the implementation of policy, practice and pedagogy that is aimed at supporting student achievement and eliminating the barriers faced by Black students.

Nancy shared some of the work that has been created through the council. In 2020-2021, Joanna Newton had advocated for a council to center Black voices which resulted in the creation of the council. In 2021-2022, the focus remained to create a Strategic Plan to Dismantle Anti-Black Racism. That plan is aligned with the Multi-Year Strategic Plan (MYSP) and was placed on the Board website in June 2022. As the MYSP is being revisited, that could be part of the work of the council this year. The MYSP is on the Board website for members to look at and provide feedback. In 2022-2023, a Terms of Reference was developed to provide guidelines to follow. Throughout the past two years, working groups which included non-council members were implemented. They have worked on community engagement, data and curriculum resources. Also, a student group was created with one BCAC student representative from every secondary school. They meet throughout the year with the graduation coaches for Black students.

b. Setting Dates for 2023-2024

Nancy Cargioli advised that council members decided to hold council meetings in person. During the winter months, depending on weather conditions, the meeting could be moved to virtual.

Mondays were selected for council meetings to accommodate the superintendent's schedule but, through a survey to council members, the dates can be changed to accommodate the majority of the council.

c. Trustee Discussion

Nancy Cargioli advised that some members wanted to have trustee representation and were asking questions about having a trustee present at in person council meetings. Nancy asked council if they wanted a trustee present at all meetings and if they want it to be a specific trustee or an open invitation for all trustees to attend.

Gord Gallimore explained that trustees represent different regions of the Board. The Board of Trustees are responsible for Board governance and the Director of Education is responsible for Board operations. School board policies are approved by the trustees. Trustees are elected officials and the Director of Education reports directly to the Board of Trustees. Therefore, having trustee representation would be beneficial to the council.

A discussion ensued.

Dr. Carl James suggested selecting a trustee representing an area where there are a significant number of Black students. Gord Gallimore suggested looking at the data to see what areas have the highest number of Black students. Linda Tobi-Isiekwena suggested finding a trustee who would be more vocal and advocate on behalf of the council.

The council voted in favour of having a trustee present through invitation only for a portion of the meeting.

d. Update Hiring Practices within DPCDSB

f. Equity System Planning 2023-2024

Nancy Cargioli advised that every school has a Catholic Equity Lead. They are provided with professional development with a focus on dismantling anti-Black racism centering on cultivating and sustaining intentional spaces of belonging for Black students.

Jaclynn Deveaux-Matthews shared updates regarding system wide planning and targeted groups for the year.

A conversation ensued surrounding the recommendation to continue to uplift learning opportunities for Black students in STEM.

A conversation ensued surrounding best practices and advisory on resource selection fostering positive representation, dissemination of information, program pathways, mentoring programs and other programs as it relates to student learning.

A discussion ensued surrounding uplifting the Black Voices course in secondary schools and continuing to build teacher capacity surrounding bias and positionality for educators who do not identify as Black.

g. Black Expo Event

Lorian Feres shared that together with Michelle Thompson and Kwadwo Adusei, as the Black Excellence Success Team (B.E.S.T.) executives, they came to talk about how they are supporting Black students to excel in different fields. The Black Professionals Expo will be taking place on Wednesday, November 8 at Notre Dame C.S.S. at 6:30 pm.

Lorian commented that they are aware that the SROs are out of schools. However, many students have approached her and are interested in getting into policing or similar fields. At this expo, for change to happen, they have to be a part of that change. They are looking at how to support those students that want to get into the force.

A discussion ensued.

Dr. Carl James commented that is not about the Black police officer but the culture of policing and the institution. If we know Black students want to become police officers, how can we teach and help them understand the culture to which they would be going.

A discussion ensued.

Dr. Carl James commented that they need to consider how to make the school and students ready and really work through these types of things. What will happen beyond the expo in every day curriculum and every day conversations? How were students prepared before now for relationships between Black people and police officers?

A discussion ensued surrounding how this may look going forward.

h. Community Engagement Planning

Deferred to next meeting.
