

What is Cooperative Education?

Experiential learning is the foundation for Cooperative Education.

Students in grade 11 or 12 participate in rich, immersive learning experiences connected to a community experience or "placement "outside of the school. Their placement employer and supervisor will guide and support students in their learning, along with their Cooperative Education teacher.

Students receive a wide range of rigorous learning opportunities in the classroom and at a community placement in a career area that they want to explore.

Cooperative Education in secondary school can be designed to include up to four Cooperative Education credits per semester. There is no restriction on the total number of Cooperative Education credits that a student may earn.

Benefits to students:

- · Acquire skills and knowledge at the community experience placement
- · Become a better decision-maker by reflecting on learning experiences
- · Become competent and confident in planning for a career and for life

What is OYAP?

OYAP is the Ontario Youth Apprenticeship Program.

OYAP is a specialized Cooperative Education program for students who choose a community experience or placement in any of the 144+ skilled trades.

Students must be 16* years of age and have completed 14 credits to be an OYAP Participant. OYAP Participant forms must be submitted by the Co-op teacher. Students earn credits towards a high school diploma and gain skills and knowledge at the community placement under the supervision of a professional tradesperson.

Through OYAP, participants may also apply to become a registered apprentice with the ministry. To become a registered apprentice, a registered training agreement must be signed.

Apprenticeship is post-secondary education. Skilled trades are a viable career option.

*Some trades/sectors will permit students to begin OYAP at 15 years of age.







EDUCATION

What is Apprenticeship?

Apprenticeship is an education and training post-secondary pathway for people who enjoy learning by doing, and who want to work in the skilled trades.

- An apprentice: a person enrolled in a skilled trade for the purpose of learning the specific competencies and theory related to that trade
- 90% of apprenticeship is hands-on provided by employers at a work site
- 10% of apprenticeship is classroom instruction provided by a college or approved training agent, the classroom instruction is refer to as Level 1, 2, or 3.
- The length of an Apprenticeship: 2-5 years to complete, depending on the skilled trade
- Does an apprentice graduate? An "apprentice" finishes or completes an apprenticeship when 100% of the education and training in-class and on-the-job prepares the apprentice to write successfully a ministry qualifying exam. The apprentice then receives a Certificate of Qualification or Certificate of Apprenticeship, which indicates that he/she is now a certified or licensed skilled tradesperson



What is Accelerated OYAP Level 1? It's Level 1 In-class Apprenticeship Training

Accelerated OYAP Level 1 gives students with a passion for the skilled trades a way to fast track their learning and begin the apprenticeship pathway in high school.

Students gain both hands-on learning in a skilled trade Cooperative Education placement and in-class training at a college or union training site to take in-class Level 1 courses.

Students may apply to one of the available Level 1 programs listed in this handbook.

Accelerated OYAP Level 1 students

- Take 4-credit Cooperative Education in the second semester of their graduating year
- Register as an apprentice. Signed a Registered Training Agreement
- Take Level 1 Apprenticeship In-Class Training at a college, union or training centre
- Earn hours towards their apprenticeship training
- Earn up to 4 high school Cooperative Education credits AND possibly 2 or 3 dual credits

Registered Training Agreements must be signed by student, parent (if student is under 18) and Cooperative Education employer before the start of Level 1 classes.

How do I apply for Accelerated OYAP Level 1? Speak to your guidance counsellor and complete the application

- ✓ Complete the application
- ✓ Attend the college or training centre October Open House information night
- ✓ Give the completed application to your guidance counsellor by the end of October
- ✓ Interview at the college or training site in November/December/January
- ✓ Begin OYAP Level 1 in-class apprenticeship training during semester 2 of Cooperative Education



OYAP-FOCUSED Apprenticeship Skills Training Program



- Are you a hands-on learner who wants to get a head start on a rewarding career in the skilled trades?
- Would you like to work toward becoming an apprentice while earning your high school diploma?
- Are you interested in earning 8-11 cooperative education credits in the skilled trades?
- To sign up for the OYAP- Focused Apprenticeship Skills Training Program, speak to your guidance counsellor

Focused Apprenticeship Skills Training is an accelerated stream within OYAP that will allow students in Grade 11 and 12 to participate in apprenticeship learning through additional cooperative education credits while completing their Ontario Secondary School Diploma (OSSD).

Students will take 8-11 credits of co-operative education in the skilled trades as an OYAP participant. Students will also have a Registered Training Agreement (RTA) by the 8th co-op credit.

Students who meet the completion requirements and all other OSSD requirements will be awarded the OYAP-FOCUSED Apprenticeship Skills Training seal on their OSSD, and will be listed in





their Ontario Student Transcript (OST).

AUTOBODY & COLLISION DAMAGE REPAIRER

An Auto Body and Collision Damage Repairer repairs and/or replaces frame and structural components, mechanical, interior, plastic and composite panels and sheet metal panels. A damage repairer also welds breaks in body panels and removes and replaces wiring harnesses and electrical components.

In this program, students complete an 8-week Cooperative Education placement with a licensed automotive service technician, then attend Centennial College, Ashtonbee College for the 8-week "Level 1" in-school apprenticeship training.

Total Training Hours (on-the-job + in-school levels) = 8000 Hours 310B Red Seal

PROGRAM COMPONENTS INCLUDE:

- In-class Cooperative Education community placement
 preparation
- Cooperative Education placement with an Auto Body and Collision Damage Repairer licensed employer; a registered training agreement is required
- 8 weeks (Monday to Friday) at Centennial College, Ashtonbee Campus
- Program runs April June

This program combines apprenticeship in-class training at Centennial College and provides a Cooperative Education placement in the Transportation Sector in an automotive service industry.

Students in Grade 12 must be in their graduating year with a minimum of 26 credits.







- Earn 4 Cooperative Education credits
- Earn 2 additional Dual Credits upon successful completion of the Level 1 Apprenticeship curriculum at Centennial College, Ashtonbee Campus

- Be in your graduating year, enrolled in 4 credit Cooperative Education for semester 2
- Have experience and passion for a career as an Autobody and Collision Damage Repairer
- Be in good academic standing with compulsory courses completed at the end of semester 1
- Demonstrate strong work habits, positive attitude and good attendance
- Be willing and able to arrive punctually at Centennial College Ashtonbee Campus
- Subject to Ministry funding approvals, transportation arrangements and/or bus passes and/or college parking passes may be coordinated and funded

AUTOMOTIVE SERVICE TECHNICIAN

An automotive service technician inspects, diagnoses, repairs, and services mechanical, electrical, and electronic systems and components of cars, buses, and trucks.

In this program, students complete an 8-week Cooperative Education placement with a licensed automotive service technician, then attend Centennial College, Ashtonbee College for the 8-week "Level 1" in-school apprenticeship training.

PROGRAM COMPONENTS INCLUDE:

- Cooperative Education in-class preparation for community placement
- A Cooperative Education placement with a licensed Automotive Service Technician as a sponsoring employer; a registered training agreement is required
- Program runs from April June

This program combines apprenticeship in-class training at Centennial College and provides a Cooperative Education placement in the Transportation Sector in an automotive service industry.

Students in Grade 12 must be in their graduating year with a minimum of 26 credits.









- Earn 4 Cooperative Education Credits
- Earn 2 additional Dual Credits upon successful completion of the Level 1 apprenticeship curriculum at Centennial College, Ashtonbee Campus
- Complete a "Level 1" apprenticeship training designation as a Automotive Service Technician with valuable work experience and extensive skills training

Baking is a practice of mindfulness #SkilledTrades

BAKER

Bakers mix and bake ingredients to produce breads, pastries, and other baked goods. Many bakers work in kitchens, large grocery stores, and bakery shops. Other bakers may also work for companies that manufacture large quantities of baked goods.

This program provides an opportunity for students to begin and complete the "Level 1" of their in-school apprenticeship training at Humber College and work as an apprentice in a variety of high quality bake shops throughout the Peel Region and GTA.

Total Training Hours (on-the-job + in-school levels) = 6000 Hours 423A

PROGRAM COMPONENTS INCLUDE:

- Cooperative Education in-class preparation for community placement
- An integrated schedule throughout semester 2 combines Level 1 Apprenticeship Training and a bakery Cooperative Education placement; a registered training agreement is required
- Program runs from February June

This program combines apprenticeship in-class training at Humber College and/or George Brown College provides a Cooperative Education placement in the food services industry. It is offered in Semester 2 and is open to students in their graduating year with a minimum of 26 credits.









- Earn 3 Cooperative Education credits towards your Ontario Secondary School Diploma
- Earn 3 additional Dual Credits upon successful completion of "Level 1"
- Earn a "Level 1" apprenticeship training designation as a Baker at the college

The education and training opportunities provided at Humber College and/or George Brown College in partnership with their Cooperative Education Department at their home school allows students to be placed in bake shops throughout the GTA with qualified bakers. Upon graduation, students who remain in the industry through part-time or full-time employment will continue their apprenticeship towards a Certificate of Apprenticeship.

***TO QUALIFY FOR THE LEVEL 1 TRAINING IN SEMESTER 2:**

- Be in your graduating year with at least 26 credits
- Have at least 26 credits
- Have experience and a passion for working in the baking industry
- Be in good academic standing, including completion of all compulsory courses
- Be willing to travel to the college and to a Cooperative Education placement
- Be willing to attend the college from February to June, concurrently with a Cooperative Education placement
- Have minimum 65% Grade 11 Mathematics

BRICK & STONE MASON

A Brick and Stone Mason uses bricks, concrete blocks, stone, structural tiles and other materials to construct or repair walls, foundations and other structures. They are also responsible for preparing surfaces to be covered and mixing ingredients they'll need like mortar or cement. Preparatory work such as caulking and cleaning and placing damp proofing and masonry flashing is also done by Masons.

Masons do a variety of residential work including restoring damaged brick work, putting up ornamental or retaining walls and constructing brick driveways, patios, chimneys, and glass block walls.

Total Training Hours (on-the-job + in-school levels) = 5600 Hours 401A Red Seal

PROGRAM COMPONENTS INCLUDE:

- 8 weeks at OMTC to complete the Level 1 training
- 6 weeks at a Cooperative Education placement in the construction industry with sponsoring employer

This program combines Level 1 training at the Ontario Masonry Training Centre and a Cooperative education placement in the industry. It is offered in Semester 2 and is open to students in their graduating year with a minimum of 26 credits.

- Grade 11 Workplace College Mathematics
- Grade 12 Workplace or College English

Cooking is edible art and chemistry #SkilledTrades

СООК

A Cook prepares complete meals or individual dishes and food items, plans menus, estimates food requirements and costs, monitors and orders supplies.

In this program, students begin and complete the "Level 1" in-school apprenticeship training in order to pursue a career as a Cook. The education and training opportunities are provided at Humber College and/or George Brown College, and students are placed in restaurants throughout the GTA with qualified chefs.

Upon graduation, students are encouraged to remain in the industry through parttime or full time employment and continue their apprenticeship education towards full certification.

Total Training Hours (on-the-job + in-school levels) = 6000 Hours 415A Red Seal

PROGRAM COMPONENTS INCLUDE:

- Cooperative Education in-class preparation for community placement
- An integrated schedule throughout semester two combining "Level 1" and a Cooperative Education placement.
- A Cooperative Education placement with a food services facility of distinction; a registered training agreement is required
- Program runs from February June

This program combines instruction in high school and at Humber College and/or George Brown College and provides a Cooperative Education placement in the food services industry. It is offered in Semester 2 and is open to students in their graduating year with a minimum of 26 credits.









- Earn 3 Cooperative Education credits towards your Ontario Secondary School Diploma.
- Earn 3 additional Dual Credits upon successful completion of "Level 1"
- Earn a "Level 1" apprenticeship training designation as a Cook

***TO QUALIFY FOR THE LEVEL 1 TRAINING IN SEMESTER 2:**

- Be in your graduating year with at least 26 credits
- · Have experience and passion for working in culinary arts
- · Be in good academic standing, including completion of all compulsory courses
- Be willing to travel to the college and to a Cooperative Education placement

CONSTRUCTION CRAFT WORKER LOCAL 183

A Construction Craft Worker (CCW) is a construction labourer. The CCW apprenticeship is an extremely versatile trade that offers the trainee the capacity to work in a variety of sectors and construction fields. The following describes some of the tasks completed by the Construction Craft Worker apprentice; erects and dismantles concrete forms, scaffolding, ramps, catwalks, shoring and barricades required at construction sites; mixes and pours materials such as concrete and asphalt; removes rubble and other debris: assists in demolition (including sorts, cleans and piles savaged materials); operates various power tools, machines and other equipment as directed (i.e. mixers, compressors, pumps, pneumatic hammers).

Total Training Hours (on-the-job + in-school levels) =2400 Hours 450A Red Seal
